I have once again broken a rule by not regularly reading the bylaws.



I will try to redeem myself by doing this at the next meeting or the next regular meeting. Anyone want to volunteer for this? We just need three members.





Tips for shooting panoramics

These tips along with more detail can be found in the October issue of "Outdoor Photographer" magazine.

Scenes that work best:

- 1) One subject and lots of surrounding context
- 2) Location where you can shoot from a high vantage point
- 3) Sunsets and sunrises

Shooting tips:

- 1) Make sure your tripod is level
- 2) Use manual settings for white balance, shutter speed, aperture and focus

3) Overlap images by 25 to 30 percent

4) User remote release and mirror lock-up, if available

September Field Trip Report

Autumn Day in the High Country

It was about 7:05AM when Andy and I arrived at the west side Safeway at 32nd Street and Colorado Avenue. Awaiting our arrival were brother Tom, Deb and Ron James and Tim and George Starr. Giving any others a few more minutes to show, I went in to Safeway and grabbed a power bar for breakfast, and a sandwich and chips for lunch. With food in hand I went back to the waiting group.

Tom joined Andy and me in the Blazer. Deb and Ron were in a Ford Escape, and Tim and George was in a really pretty red Fire Bird. I knew the Horse Shoe Basin was a mild back country road, but I didn't know now the Fire Bird was going to fare up there. After letting Tim know that he could ride in one or the other vehicles when the going got rough, we headed west on highway 24. We topped Wilkerson Pass and looked over at the Mosquito Range. It was white. Not from clouds, but from snow, and Horse Shoe Basin was no exception.

We stopped at a gas station in Fairplay, and I joked that we should have brought snow shoes. The mountains looked white, but not as white as they did from South Park. As we headed up Four Mile Creek Road, just south of Fairplay, we passed an old mine. Tim stopped to photograph it, so we all stopped too. This was a nice break, and a chance to get out and get our photographic zones warmed up for the basin.

I stopped at the cross roads where one road goes to the Mount Sherman trail head, and the other heads up in to the basin. The road gets a little rougher from this point on, and I wanted to see how the Fire Bird was doing so far. With no worries, I headed out, Tim followed, and Ron was at the rear. We took our time, and Tim took the Fire Bird all the way to the parking area. We went by a couple in a big ol' 4X4, and they sure gave the Fire Bird a looking over. At the parking area we got out and I took a group picture of all us and the Fire Bird. All but Tom,as he was already on his way to the tarn to make pictures.

We gathered at the tarn, and the weather was perfect for reflections. The snow gave the mountains a rougher appearance as well as a better contrast to the blue sky. I will admit I was in my own zone up there. It has been a long while since I've been up there, and I totally enjoyed it. I finally got back to the Blazer at around 2:PM. I ate lunch with Tom; the others had eaten already, and were patiently waiting for me to get back.

September Field Trip Report (cont.)

After lunch the five of us head down the road to the Limber Pine Grove in this area. (Tim and George took off around noon so that George could have a sleep over that evening.) Tom, Deb, and Ron take the trail that heads out from the Four Mile Creek Road. Andy and I went to the trail head in the Horse Shoe Camp Ground. This trail is very nice. It goes through a thickly wooded forest. The closer we got to the Limber Pine Grove the more limber pines we started to see. Then we broke out of the thick forest in to an opening with limber pines scattered throughout.

I stopped here, at the eastern edge of the opening. This area is very rocky, and we could hear pika. I could hear them, but couldn't get any shots until I stopped and waited by a huge boulder. Then a couple came out and went about their daily affairs of gathering vegetation for the winter. I took a few photos of the pika, and then the sun broke through the clouds and I headed for the limber pines.

A lot of the pines were already in the shadow of Sheep Mountain. (Personal Note: The Limber Pine Grove is a better morning photography hot spot.) I was able to find a few pines being lit by the evening light and started to get in the zone again. We shot the pines until a cloud bank in the west flattened the light.

With the light flat, and the day drawing to an end, Tom and I headed back to the Blazer. Andy had already started back ahead of us. We caught up with Andy about halfway down the trail. When the three of us arrived at the Blazer, Ron and Deb were there waiting patiently for us.

Tom, Andy and I loaded our gear into the Blazer, and down to Fairplay the five of us went in search of food. After doing a tour of Fairplay, and finding nothing but Pub and Grub type places, emphasis on the Pub, we ended up at Pizza Hut. We ate our pizza, and enjoyed reminiscing about what a fine autumn day in the high country we had.
