

Morro Bay is one of my favorite spots on California's Central Coast. This shot was quite opportunistic. We were having dinner at a restaurant that overlooks the harbor one evening when there was gorgeous sunset. I took my camera out on the patio for some sunset pictures. This one was taken shortly after the sun had dropped below the horizon. Morro Rock was silhouetted in the background and looked almost like it was suspended above the water. The combination of the very soft background and still water made the boats in the foreground and their reflections look like they were floating in front of the image.

My camera is a Sony A-550. Exposure data: ISO 1600, f/5.6, speed 1/40 sec, focal length 40 mm. The image is pretty much as shot. I made only a minor exposure adjustment in Photoshop.

My July image in the open category was Fallen Fence. The image was taken on 7/3/2017 late afternoon at 1/100 sec., f16, ISO 200, with a Nikon 5100, lens 24mm. I was leaving a weekend visit with a friend outside of Fairplay, CO going down County Road 5, when the late afternoon sunshine turn to an overcast sky. I really like mountain landscapes with abandoned man made items and a moody cloudy overcast sky in black and white. So with the light perfect for that kind of picture I started looking for a subject. There was an old ranch with abandon corrals and fences falling down. I pulled over to the side of the road and started taking pictures. Once I got home and processed the shots I saw that this would be a good black & white image.
