While in San Diego for the holidays last year, I drove up the coast to Oceanside to do a little sightseeing in the area, and planned to be at the pier for sunset. I saw children below the pier and quickly realized what was causing their delightful shouts. Looking up, I saw a man with a huge bubble wand and a bucket of soap waving giant bubbles out over the pier for everyone's amusement. The kids weren't the only ones delighted. I loved how the setting sun reflected light in the bubbles.

During the training for my first season of volunteering at Big Bend National Park, I learned that in 2012, it had been designated an International Dark Sky Park by the International Dark Sky Association. Because of the parks location it makes for some of the darkest night skies in North America. I have always loved images of stars and space, so while being in this unique place, I decided to give night photography a try. I bought the book "Photography: Night Sky: A Field Guide for Shooting after Dark" and learned enough to start giving star field photgraphy a try.

Cerro Castellan is a volcanic formation near the Castolon visitor center on the west side of the park. After consulting with my Stellarium software program (free), I decided that the best opportunity I was going to have to photograph the Milky Way was in early May. I went out about 2am and experimented with different settings on the camera, with this being my favorite image. This image was captures at 3:16am. Techincal info: Nikon d5100, Sigma 18-50mm lens set at 18mm (27mm equivelent), *f* 2.8, 30 sec exposure, ISO 3200, tripod and wireless remote. Post processing done in Lightroom 5.7.

The Occulus is difficult to describe. Located in Southeastern Utah, (we were sworn to secrecy regarding its exact location), it's a destination for adventurous folks wanting to experience a 100+ foot free rappel through the Occulus and down into a cave like grotto. After hiking up slickrock, slot canyons, and past unique rock art, we finally arrived at the top of the Occulus. As we put on our climbing gear, our guide, Christopher Hagedorn, secured the ropes and safety gear. I was the first to go over the edge, through the Occulus, and down to the floor of the grotto...wanting the trip down to last a lot longer than it did. Our friend's turn was next. As he paused on the edge of the Occulus, getting last minute instructions from the guide before beginning his descent, I was able to shoot several images of his poised silhouette. I used my trusty Olympus TG-3, on the auto setting.
