This photo was taken on a fabulous trip Bill and I took to Russia, Mongolia, and China using the small Adventurous Tour Group called "Intrepid". We traveled on the Trans-Siberian Express, later changing to the Trans Mongolian Express, while stopping for overnights in various small towns. The photo was taken while walking in Irkutsk, Siberia, on our way to finding a restaurant for dinner. The bright blue caught my eye and I snapped the photo with my old Fuji Digital Camera. No, we did not stop there for dinner, probably because we couldn't read the sign. And no, I didn't do any post-processing at that time. It was just the right time of day in the right place. We noticed the Russians loved bright blue on that trip!

I made a trip back to Lake Geneva, Wisconsin at the end of August. On my last night in the area I was still looking for a picture of a sign and was passing through the little town in the late evening and saw several neon lights. I tried several setting on the different signs, but there was something in all the others that took away from the sign itself. Finally I tried several angles and several settings to come up with this image. I was using a tripod and an ISO setting of 640.I took the picture with both a low F-stop and finally liked the F-stop of F-32. The exposure time was 2 secs with a focal length on the lens at 110 mm. Timing also played a part in this image since I had to wait several times for cars to pass by and hope that other would not enter the frame. It was all worth it since I really like how this image turned out.

The focus of my 3-week trip to Africa in August and September 2017 was Swaziland. Finally, after 37 years, I visited a dear friend who I met in Nairobi in the late 1970's when we were both diplomats representing our respective countries.

I noted that Mozambique was close by (3 hours by car plus a $\frac{1}{2}$ hour at the border crossings). So, off we went.

The photo was taken at 10AM September 2 while in the Swaziland mountains just west of Mozambique. First rain, then fog. The photo was taken on "P" setting with my 10-year old plus Fujifilm Finepix point-and-shoot camera (my first digital) through the front window of a slowly moving vehicle. Only post processing was cropping to fit the mat - the objective of a true photographer is to capture a scene the way it is, not to post process something artificial.
