

THE PRESIDENT'S CORNER

KAREN MORRIS

Our scheduled speaker for October, Raye, has decided to cancel her workshop with us because she is recovering from Covid-19. I wish her a complete recovery. Raye's topic was to have been Street Photography, so I've found a "Cheat Sheet" on Street Photography on the Picture Correct website.

What To Look For:

*Tell Stories - Find details that hint at a larger meaning.

*Emotion – When capturing people, seek out expressive faces, hands, and postures. Try to capture images that will invoke feeling in the viewer.

*Capture Unique People - Capture interesting scenes that say something, or provide a background for a portrait of an interesting person.

Design and Composition:

*Quality and Direction of Light – Seek out interesting and dynamic light, in front of you, behind you, or above.

*Colors and Lines – Seek out scenes with interesting and complementary colors. Diagonal lines can add energy and can lead a viewer's eyes into a scene. Does the photo feel balanced?

React:

*Notice People From Farther Away – This will give you more time to get in position and create a pleasing composition.

*Chose a Spot and Wait For People to Come to You – Chose an interesting background or area ahead of time, get in position, and wait for people to enter it.

*Patience – Waiting an extra few minutes can be the difference between a mediocre image and a once in a lifetime photograph.

*Smile – If someone notices you taking their picture, smile at them. You may be surprised at how often they will smile back!

<u>Settings:</u>

*Shutter Speed – Scenes without moving people or objects: I/focal length (i.e. with a 50 mm lens, you would want to be at least at $1/50^{th}$ of a second.) Scenes with moving people or objects: $1/320^{th}$, ($1/160^{th}$ minimum).

*Aperture – Use a small aperture ((large number) for a larger range of sharpness (large depth of field).

*High ISO – Using a higher ISO (800/1600/3200 depending on lighting conditions) can allow you to use a higher f/stop.

*Use a Wide-Angle or Normal Lens (28, 35, or 50 mm).

Even if we are avoiding crowded street scenes right now, we can plan, strategize, and research while we wait for our next opportunity to travel and capture images of unique street scenes.

Patience is not simply the ability to wait - it's how we behave while we're waiting.

Every trip I look forward to getting up early at least one morning and exploring the streets. It becomes an opportunity for me to learn where I'm visiting by capturing the little moments occurring within the city. This photo was taken in Cusco, Peru on the edges of the city. I was simply meandering the streets trying to capture the quiet early morning activities as I caught this woman heading down the hill from me into the city. I am still learning so much about many fields of photography. I love how street photography focuses on capturing the small moments that occur every day. It's a simple shot but I really enjoy how these ordinary captures can be relatable to so many people. I don't remember the particulars of this film image settings but I generally am shooting with a speed no lower than 1/250 and an aperture of f/8 or f/11 to be able to capture a moving scene quickly and with detail. I shoot black and white film partially for ease of development but also because it once again creates simplicity and brings the focus to the subject. I developed the film myself and printed this image using a darkroom with Bemis Art School. I still love watching the image appear in the trays of chemicals. This reminds me back to the "magic" of photography that still inspires me daily.

The picture was taken with a Nikon D610 and A Nikkor 70-300mm lens.

Exposure details: focal length – 140mm

shutter speed – 1/200 sec.

aperture - f/5.6
