His darkroom craftsmanship was amazing. As we watched the video of him in his darkroom, I cringed as I watched him rumple up a print that was unsatisfactory to him, but would have been a treasure for any one of us!

7:30 Monthly Competition

\* As I researched a little about Ansel Adams, I learned more about his approach to photography. His work is "distinguished by his interest in the transient and ephemeral. He photographed at varying times of the day and of the year, capturing the landscape's changing light and atmosphere."

Art critic, John Szarkowski wrote, "Ansel Adams attuned himself more precisely than any photographer before him to a visual understanding of the specific quality of the light that fell on a specific place at a specific moment." Adams believed that the natural landscape is not fixed and solid...but as transient as the light that redefines it. He had a unique sensibility to the specificity of light, which led him to develop his photographic technique.

"While Adams and portrait photographer, Fred Archer, were teaching at the Art Center School in Los Angeles, around 1939-40, they developed the Zone System for managing the photographic process, which was based on sensitometry - the study of the light-sensitivity of photographic materials and the relationship between exposure time and the resulting density on a negative. The Zone System can also be applied to images captured on roll film, both black-and-white and color, negative and reversal, and to digital photography."

My wife and I joined Bill Rose and his wife on the club outing to Florissant Fossil Beds. We watched a movie about the origins of the National Monument. In the movie they told about the early days and how people would take pieces of the petrified trees home. They talked about how some people tried to use a saw to cut pieces off of the Big Stump and how the saw broke and remained in the stump. It dawned on me while I was taking pictures of the stump that what I was looking at was the broken saw so I framed the picture to capture both visible pieces of the broken saw, I shot in camera RAW, so in post processing I lighted the exposure, sharped with un-sharp mask and bumped up the contrast a little.

I approached the August topic with the thinking that an image of an entire petrified tree stump could look a lot like merely a big rock. I decided to use this opportunity to do some "micro" photography ... this is Nikon terminology for "macro". I got out my Micro Nikkor 200mm f/4 lens, which I hadn't used often. It is a very special lens, produced by Nikon from 1993 to 2020 ... by many considered the finest macro lens ever made. I purchased it last year on eBay, which is a marvelous place to acquire photographic equipment if you are careful. Often, well maintained used equipment is available at a fraction of the price of new, if the piece is even still made.

I decided to focus on a small area of petrified tree, as close as possible ... so I choose approximately a 2'x2' section of the petrified stump known as "The Bid Stump". It is perhaps the most well-known stump at the Florissant Fossil Beds. I set the lens at f/4 (wide open), and using a tripod got within 10-12 feet of the stump. Once at my computer, I carefully scanned the image to find a small area which had a unified theme ... sort of an abstract art feeling. I actually turned the small section which ended up being about a 2"x3" part of the whole image upside down so the texture flowed from lower right to upper left. Voila.
