

# **President's Corner by Karen Morris**

I came across this interesting article and wondered if any of you have heard these "photography myths"...5 of the most exasperating misconceptions about photography. I've certainly heard a few of them!

<u>1. "Photography is easy."</u> Sure, it's easy to take a picture, but being a photographer is more than just taking a picture. It's not as easy as what most people think. It's an art. To take a visually appealing picture, one that makes the observer stop and think, requires experience and skill. As a photographer, you must understand how lighting works, when to actually take the picture, and countless other variables to take a dynamic image.

<u>2. "Your camera takes great pictures!"</u> No, it doesn't...YOU take great pictures. Your camera is merely a tool that allows you to execute your skills to your highest ability. Usually, the person delivering this statement means it in a positive way, but it insinuates that the camera, not you, is the mastermind behind your photographs. This kind of statement is essentially dismissing the years of experience, the amount of practice, and your overall skills in photography. Also, using a more expensive camera does not necessarily mean your photos will be better. You can give aa novice a really expensive camera, and it does not mean that their photos will outperform an experienced photographer with a low-budget camera.

<u>3. "Nikon is better than Canon."</u> Saying Nikon is better than Canon is like saying apples are better than oranges. It's a completely misleading way of thinking in terms of photography. Basically, Nikon and Canon are both excellent camera brands. However, one might be more suitable for one person, and the other might be more suitable for the other person. The camera choice is all relative to the camera owner. It depends on exactly what you want to do with the camera, and what you want to achieve.

<u>4."Age is a barrier to success."</u> The submissions from our high school competitors proves this is not true. There is no lower or upper age limit to being a successful photographer. Basically, the point is to disprove the misconception that age is a barrier to success. People of all ages, sexes, races, etc. can be extremely passionate about photography. All of those things are simply unimportant to their success as photographers.

<u>5. "Black-and-white images are better and more professional."</u> Finally, we have come to a point we often hear from judges. Black-and-white photos can work very well, but the lack of color does not instantly make them better or appear more professional. It depends on the photo itself and how and why the black-and-white has been executed. There is far more to skilled photography than people sometimes understand.

# The Story Behind the Photo.....

This is the section in the newsletter where each month I ask certain club members to share their story on how they took their award winning photo.

I was up in Yellowstone National Park the first part of May. Parts of the park were still closed due to snow and I just had to take what I could get.

This buffalo was standing on a hill with the steam rising up behind it, really made it stand out. As I looked through my pictures back at home, this one stood out to me because of the sharpness of the buffalo.

With his brown tones in it's coat I decided to use a Sepia filter on the picture to set it as a monochromatic image to fit the subject for March.

I used a 70 to 200 mm lens and was at 200 mm. My shutter speed was 1/200, and the f-stop was 5.6. My ISO was set at 100.

i used some post processing to crop the picture some, also contrast and some lighting to bring out the buffalo's full image.

### Pikes Peak Camera Club - Meeting & Subjects 2024

January - Windows. The focal point of your image is one or more windows

February - Sculptures and/or Statues. The focal point of your image is one or more sculptures or statues.

March - Monochromatic. Your image has a color scheme that is based on a single color or hue. It may include light and dark variations of that single color or hue.

April - Feet. Not necessarily human.

May - Reptiles. A vertebrate animal with dry scaly skin, including snakes, lizards, alligators, crocodiles, turtles and tortoises.

June - Flying High. Anything as long as it is in the air and in motion.

July - Blur. The visual streaming or smearing of the image, as the result of movement of the camera, the subject or both.

August - Come Closer. Micro/Macro photography where the subject is like size or larger than life.

**September - Heavy Metal.** Metal of any sort, whether shiny, rusty or industrial.

October - Collector's Treasures. Dust off those vintage items and share images of your personal treasures...Family heirlooms, antiques, vintage toys or cars or any other treasure you might find.

**November - Texture/Pattern.** The focal point of your image shows the texture or pattern of an object or objects. Your image could also create a pattern through the placement of various objects.

#### **2024 Salon**

**Prints - PPCC Award - Exotic.** Out of the ordinary, not apart of our daily lives.

**President's Award - Framed.** The focal point of your image is framed by something else.

Digital - Newsletter Editor's Award - Flowers, Flowers and more Flowers. The focal point of your image is one or more flowers.
